

Rock, drama, glamour and tragedy conform Led Zeppelin's history, one of the most influential and successful bands of the past century. Their origin is somewhat confused, but all would begin because of the ambition of Jimmy Page, an ex-member of the band "The Yardbirds", who wanted to develop a new musical project. That's how in 1968 Led Zeppelin, integrated by Robert Plant (singer), Jimmy Page (guitarist), John Paul Jones (bass guitarist) and John Bonham (drummer), would debut in Copenhague belonging to the name "The New Yardbirds". After that, Page decided to rename the band to Led Zeppelin.

In 1969, the group published their first album "Led Zeppelin" where songs like "Communication Breakdown", "Good Times Bad Times" and "Babe, I'm Gonna Leave You", conquer the audience with potential sounds and epic lyrics. The same year the British quartet got out "Led Zeppelin II" and "Led Zeppelin III" would not be long in coming (1970). Both albums obtained sales success just as all the rest of LPs.

With tiny clothes, long hairs and extravagant attitudes, the band delighted the public in their shows. But nothing may be only light. Excesses with the drugs, crazy parties and wild relationships, would spoil the reputation of the band. Thus, Led Zeppelin was accused of occultism, Satanism and sadism.
